STANDING ORDER
PROCEDURE FOR MODIFICATION OF CHAPTER 13 PLAN DANNY L. MILLER, CLERK
 DEPUTY CLERK

This standing order establishes a procedure for modification of Chapter 13 plans and supplements Miss. Bankr. L.R. 3015-1.

Modification of Chapter 13 Plan Prior to Confirmation

The debtor may file a modification of a Chapter 13 plan with the clerk of court at any time before the plan is confirmed in accordance with 11 U.S.C. § 1323(a). The attorney for the debtor (or the debtor) shall send a notice of such modification to the trustee, United States Trustee, and all creditors affected by the modification. The notice must include a statement that recipients have 21 days to object to the proposed modification by filing an objection with the court. The attorney for the debtor (or the debtor) shall file a certificate of service, including a copy of the modification and notice attached, indicating that the trustee, United States Trustee, and affected creditors were served with a copy of same. If an objection is timely filed, the court will schedule a hearing.

Modification of Chapter 13 Plan After Confirmation


The moving party shall file a Motion and Notice to Modify Confirmed Plan. The moving party shall issue a notice, with the response date, to the trustee, the United States Trustee, and all creditors affected by the modification. The motion shall include a statement that recipients have 21 days to file an objection to the proposed motion. The moving party shall attach a certificate of service to the motion and notice, indicating that the trustee, United States Trustee, and

affected creditors were served with a copy of same. If no objection is timely filed, the motion may be granted.
